Jacqueline (Jackie) Osherow is a Distinguished Professor of English at the University of Utah and the author of eight collections of poetry, most recently *My Lookalike at the Krishna Temple*, 2019. She has received grants from the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation, the National Endowment for the Arts, the Ingram Merrill Foundation and the Witter Bynner Prize from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, as well as several prizes from the Poetry Society of America. Her poems have appeared in many magazines, journals, and anthologies, including *The New Yorker, The Paris Review, American Poetry Review, the Wadsworth Anthology of Poetry, The Longman Anthology of Poetry, Best American Poetry, The Norton Anthology of Jewish-American Literature, The Penguin Book of the Sonnet, Twentieth*

Century American Poetry, and The Making of a Poem.

About her work, Rosanna Warren, former Chancellor of the Academy of American Poets, writes, "Abundant in whimsy, philosophical speculation, and earthly affections, Jacqueline Osherow's poems inhabit their forms with insouciance and wit."

- Lou Jean Flint: <u>The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek</u> by Kim Michele Richardson. Historical fiction. FDR established the first mobile library. <u>Ruthless River</u> by Holly Fitzgerald. Non-fiction. Love and survival by raft on the Amazon's relentless Madre de Dioe. While honeymooning, a couple's plane crashes in a Peruvian penal colony walled in by jungle and they must find their way back to civilization.
- David Smith: Nobel laureate Kazuo Ishiguro's new <u>Klara and the Sun</u> is written from the point of view of an artificial intelligence, an "Artificial Friend" having extraordinary observational qualities that form her emotions and actions in a future environment uniquely illuminating our own. The March issue of *Scientific American* is a worthy cover-to-cover read, but especially *"The Power of Social Justice Movements."* See also Louis Menand, "Change Your Life," *New Yorker*, March 22, 2021, which is entitled <u>"The Making of the New Left"</u> in the Web version.
- Jerilyn McIntyre: <u>The Hidden Life of Trees: What They Feel, How They Communicate—Discoveries</u> <u>from A Secret World</u> by Peter Wohllenben. The subtitle says it all: trees in a forest are social beings. Fascinating!
- Linda Keiter: <u>Icebound: Shipwrecked at the Edge of the World</u> by Andrea Pitzer. Join William Barents, the 16th century Dutch explorer (and namesake of the Barents Sea) on three arctic voyages, each more harrowing than the last, to find a northern passage to China. This reenactment of a true story pits man against ice, time, and polar bears. As a bonus, you will get a fascinating history of the great Age of Exploration. <u>The Neapolitan Novels</u> by Elena Ferrante. A beautifully written story, in four volumes, about the deep, but fraught, friendship between two remarkable Neapolitan girls as they age into young womanhood and then into women of a certain age. The first two of these novels form the basis for the excellent HBO series, *My Brilliant Friend*, with more to come.
- Wrapping up the year. The books most frequently mentioned by members of the Club were *The Warmth of Other Suns* and *Caste*, both by Isabel Wilkerson; *The Overstory* by Richard Powers; *The Splendid and the Vile* by Eric Larson; and *Circe* by Madeline Miller.
